Call to Order:

Introduction:

- Holly Howery gives an introduction and opens the floor to questions and concerns from students.

New Business:

- Issues brought up on lack academic advisors at SCSU and of food insecurity at NWCC.
- Issue brought up of lack of funding for the 23-24 semesters.
- Finalized schedule was introduced, no further discussion
- Food insecurity was discussed further; Asnuntuck recommended institutions become members of the Connecticut Food Share program – and are serving 500 students a week for free.
- Textbook prices brought up, some/few amounts of textbooks aren't stocked in campus libraries a more streamlined process for stocking and borrowing textbooks suggested to be worked on.

- Eastern talked about difficulty finding dispensers for feminine products to comply with Section 85. MCC provides menstrual products in all women's rooms and has many private donors. Compliance varies from campus to campus. Certain dispensers require payment of 25 to 75 cents which would not comply with the law, and make it inconvenient to use.
- Recreational spaces discussed. Certain institutions lack recreational space and opportunities for students. Institutions need to tackle this personally, as the SAC can not really help with space issues.
- The SAC needs to focus on an area that affects all 17 schools.
- Director of library services was recommended as a guest speaker for issues and ideas regarding textbooks and e-texts.
- Recommended that the SAC focus on the proposed budget deficits and figure out how to get additional funds for CSCU.
- QVCC brought up that it has no food vendor at all besides 4 vending machines.
- Mandate on menstrual products goes into effect July 1st 2023, and products MUST be free. Information must also be on each institution's website regarding location and availability.

Final Comments/Questions:

The topic of no classes on election day was brought up again.
